STREETS TO BE NAMED AFTER KAPOOKA TRAGEDY VICTIMS

On May 21, 1945, Geoffrey Partridge and 25 other soldiers died in Australia's worst training accident just months before the end of World War II.

The army engineers, known as sappers, were training in a bunker at the Kapooka Army Base near Wagga Wagga when an explosion killed all but one.

Eighty years on, Sapper Partridge's only sister Shirley Booth remembers it like it was yesterday.

Wrong place at the wrong time

"My father turned up [at my school] in tears and I had never seen my father cry," she said.

"The headmaster took him inside, and then the headmaster had come out and told me that my brother had been killed."

Ms Booth, who was 12, said the news didn't fully sink in at first, but when it did, it hit home hard.

"I can remember lying on my bed and praying to God it was a mistake, that it wasn't my brother, but it was, of course," she said.

Years later, she learnt her 18-year-old brother had seen the dentist that morning and was told he didn't have to return to training, but he did anyway.

"He said, 'No, I want to keep up with my training', and that was where he walked from Kapooka down to where the accident actually happened," Ms Booth said.

Within a couple of hours, her brother was dead.

She said it was only in the 1980s when she obtained records of the incident from the army that she first learnt who had died alongside her brother.

Cherie Benn's uncle Jack Nixon was another killed in the blast.

It wasn't until 50 years after the tragedy in 1995 that she learned more about what happened that day, and she first attended a commemoration in the paddock where the explosion took place.

A forgotten tragedy

Ex-military investigator Andrew Johnston served at Kapooka in the 1990s and never heard of the tragedy.

Then one day, he stumbled on an internet article about tragedies on home soil.

"Having been a soldier that raised a bit of interest to me," Mr Johnston said.

He decided to write a book on the incident to help bring closure to families of the victims and ensure they were remembered.

In 1945, Kapooka was the training centre for all army engineers.

Mr Johnston said the army had devised a system to conduct military exercises with explosions above ground while lessons were held underground.

On May 21, the soldiers had been learning about explosives and detonators.

"The instructor, Jack Pomeroy, was giving instruction to his trainees in the dugout with him, and at the time there were high explosives in a box in the corner," he said.

"And then, unfortunately, Corporal Bill Cousins came in with the detonators and something happened in which the detonators sparked and set off the high explosives.

"As a result, everything went up and collapsed the dugout and killed 26 innocent soldiers."

Mr Johnston said the sole survivor, Sapper Allan Bartlett, was looking away when the incident happened, and the exact circumstances around how the tragedy unfolded remain a mystery.

Following the tragedy, the victims received the nation's largest military burial with thousands of people turning out to pay their respects, and then Mr Johnston said Australia effectively forgot.

Streets named after victims

In addition to the annual memorial service for the tragedy, this year for the 80th anniversary, the Wagga Wagga City Council will unveil streets named in honour of the Kapooka tragedy victims.

The School of Military Engineering, now based in Sydney, will send a large contingent of officers.

Deputy head of the Royal Australian Engineers, Lieutenant Colonel Thomas Whale, said it was important the school's future leaders learnt about the tragic day.

"To ensure they understand this important part of our culture and understand the gravity of their positions and the fact that training incidents like this can happen," he said. "We just want to educate them in the incident itself and make sure they take some lessons out of it."

Lieutenant Colonel Whale said wartime deaths on home soil "don't quite" get the same recognition as those overseas, but the "damage is done either way".

"Whether you die in service overseas or you die preparing for war, it's the same death, it affects the family of that person just the same as the death overseas," he said. "Potentially, we need to look at ways to make sure that we commemorate it in the same manner."

New memorial needed

It comes as the Royal Australian Engineers Association of Victoria pushes for a national memorial to all those killed or injured in training accidents on home soil.

"There are many men and women who do suffer from accidents, incidents and even death on home soil," association president Don Hughes said.

"I think the recognition of that is becoming greater and it's well deserved. Serving a country is done while training as well as while you're deployed on operations and those operations can be here at home or overseas somewhere."

Disaster, At Kapooka Camp

Twenty-six Australian soldiers were killed and two others injured by a terrific explosion at Kapooka engineering training camp nine miles from Wagga, NSW.

The victims formed a complete section of 28 men who were receiving instruction in demolition work.

The names of the victims will not be released until their next of kin have been informed.

Kapooka is one of the chief training schools for engineers in Australia.

The [Army News of 24 May 1945](#) followed with details of the funeral:

Funeral of Kapooka Victims

The funeral of the 26 dead of the Kapooka camp tragedy took place this afternoon.

Four army trucks carried the coffins, each draped in a Union Jack, and another truck followed with wreaths and flowers. Ministers of four denominations conducted the burials.

A huge crowd watched the funeral procession and many followed it to the gravesides. Most offices and shops were closed for the afternoon.

Lest we forget



FORTY YEARS OF EXPERIENCE AND MEMORIES

Five uniforms, eight boots, four packs and five rifles – Major Deta Kerschhat has seen a lot of change in his more than 40 years of service to the Army.

In that time, he's enjoyed 17 postings, deployed on three operations and received 11 honours and awards for his long and illustrious service, including the Federation Star clasp to the Defence Long Service Medal, presented by Commander 1st (Australian) Division Major General Ash Collingburn in February.

His journey to this point began as a schoolboy, and a firm opinion about what his future was, or perhaps more pertinently, wasn't to look like.

"It's a bit of a funny story. I was in high school doing Year 12 and my father was a baker," Major Kerschhat said. "The expectation was that I was going to take over the business, but being a baker didn't particularly excite me. The Army guys come around to give their spiel at the school and I jumped onto the process, and low and behold I got accepted."

Enlisting as an apprentice vehicle mechanic on January 10, 1983, Major Kerschhat was posted to the Army Apprentices School, which at the time was still under construction at Latchford Barracks, Victoria.

He describes his first 'real' posting – having completed his apprenticeship – as 9th Transport Squadron in Townsville.

"It was a different Army back then and 3rd Brigade was always online so we were training to be always ready," he said. "We spent a fair bit of time away, but that was enjoyable."

Despite relishing the lifestyle, then-Craftsman Kerschhat had a family to prioritise. With ever-supportive wife Kerry by his side, and his young son Kieran struggling with the weather, he made the move down to Brisbane and posted into 2nd/14th Light Horse Regiment (Queensland Mounted Infantry).

In 1993, the year he posted to 49th Battalion, the Royal Queensland Regiment, and promoted from Lance Corporal to Corporal, he took on his first major extracurricular activity within Defence – volunteering to become the South Queensland coordinator for the newly founded Defence Special Needs Support Group.

"Both of my boys have their own special needs, as does my wife, so I was probably a bit unique in that all of my dependents have special needs and back then there was nothing in place to accommodate that," Major Kerschhat said.

"It made life a little more difficult but that was the case, and I wanted to keep serving and keep supporting my family."

He continued to do both of those things admirably for the next 10 years, promoting to Sergeant within that time. That was when one of the highlights of his career came along.

Posted to what was now 25th/49th Battalion, the Royal Queensland Regiment, he spent six months in Bougainville as part of the peacekeeping operation, Operation Bel-Isi.

“Experiencing the different culture and learning about how people in the South Pacific lived, and how that whole incident occurred; that was really satisfying,” Major Kerschats said.

Over the next six years he deployed on two more operations – Operation Acolyte providing security to the Commonwealth Games in Melbourne in 2006, and Operation Astute in Timor-Leste.

Returning to Australia from Timor-Leste in June 2009, then-Warrant Officer Class One Kerschats, who was posted to 5th Battalion, the Royal Australian Regiment, had a decision to make.

The unit was backing up Operation Astute with Operation Slipper in Afghanistan, but having spent so much time away from Kerry and his two boys, he decided to step away from full-time service – sort of.

On July 4, 2010, he transitioned from full-time service to the Army Reserves and on July 5, Major Kerschats began his first day as an Australian Public Service member within the logistics branch at Headquarters 1st (Australian) Division.

He showed his excellence in that role too, being awarded the Australia Day Medal in 2019 for his work in management of the Pre-deployment Training Fleet and support to the upgrade of protected mobility vehicles in the Middle East region.

Still serving in the Army Reserves during that time, he showed his commitment to Defence remained strong. He commissioned to Captain in 2019 and promoted to Major in 2023.

After a Major’s position became available in the logistics branch in December 2023, Major Kerschats decided to put his uniform back on full-time, 14 years after transitioning to the Army Reserves and becoming an APS member.

When asked what his secret was to serving for so long, both in and out of uniform, he said it came down to a simple mindset.

“Stay happy, get out of bed in the morning and enjoy your work,” Major Kerschats said.

Congratulations on an incredible career, Deta!

CONDITIONS OF SERVICE UPDATE

The following Determination has been signed and was effective from 8 May 2025.

[**Defence Determination, Conditions of Service Amendment Determination 2025 \(No. 5\).**](#)

This Determination has the following purposes:

- Amend salary advancement provisions within the Officer Aviation Pay Structure to ensure salary advancement for Combat Pilot – Troop Commanders occurs on appointment to Troop Command.
- Include Naples, Italy; and Hwacheon-gun and Inje-gun, South Korea as hardship locations to ensure members who are deployed or on short-term duty to any of these locations have access to the overseas hardship package of benefits. Locations are considered hardship locations based on information provided by Defence’s contracted service provider.
- Make a range of miscellaneous amendments that:
 - Clarify that transition absence days can be taken as either a full day or a half day.
 - Clarify that when a member is provided a storage benefit in Australia in connection with an overseas posting, that despite having their items moved from storage to their housing benefit location on return from overseas, the two removals count as one removal.
 - Substitute reference to “Maritime disability allowance” with “Maritime deployable support element allowance” as a consequence of the introduction of the Military Factor Framework.
 - Correct typographical errors and promote consistency and the use of contemporary drafting styles within the Principal Determination to improve readability; and
 - Insert a range of directly conferred decision makers into the Principal Determination.

In addition, the following Determination under the Defence Enterprise Collective Agreement 2024 have been signed – only available on DPN. *Defence Enterprise Collective Agreement 2024 (Allowances and contributions) Determination (No. 3)*

- Previously this Corps Instruction was focused on 'Student of Merit' based criteria to assess a member's ability to perform at the next rank on one particular promotion course. This meant the award was not presented to a member holding the rank afforded to the award being presented and was not indicative of a member's performance throughout the year.
- The purpose of the awards is to recognise the most outstanding RAEME members from junior officer through to soldier each year, thereby encouraging all corps members to consistently strive for excellence in both the military and technical aspects of their roles.

The award for each rank is as follows:

- Junior Officers – The LT Peter Jennings Award
- Warrant Officers – The Artificer of the year Award
- SNCOs – The BRIG Martins, OBE Award
- JNCOs – The Junior Regimental Award
- Soldiers – The Craftsman of the year Awards, including ARA and ARes.

Employment Category Managers

Aeroskills Update

In February 2025, both Aeroskills trades submitted proposals to the Defence Force Remuneration Tribunal (DFRT), which included:

- Removal of Sub 2 as a requirement for skill grade advancement
- One Pay Group (PG) increase for:
 - Skill Grade 3 (CPL) to PG6
 - Skill Grade 4 (SGT) to PG7

- Establishment of specialist career pathways:
 - Aeroskills Technician Specialist – enables tradies to remain on the tools at CPL and SGT ranks
 - Master Specialist – WO2 roles
 - Technical Warrant Officer – WO1 roles

All proposals were approved by the DFRT, with an effective date of 08 May 2025. Members should see changes reflected in their pay on 05 June 2025, with back pay applied from 08 May 2025.

In addition, the Targeted Workforce Segment (TWS) initiative — approved as Matter 4 of 2025 — aims to support ADF workforce segments deemed critical or at risk. This initiative will provide a one pay group increase for RAEME soldiers and degree-qualified officers. The effective date for TWS is 05 June 2025, with changes expected in pay by 19 June 2025.

As a result of these two DFRT outcomes, Aeroskill Technicians at Skill Grades 3 and 4 will receive a total increase of two pay groups over the coming weeks.

UPDATE ON ACT ASSOCIATION WEBSITE AND COMMUNICATIONS

Recently, nearly all ACT Association members received an email advising them that they needed to renew their memberships. This was sent automatically by our website's back-end system. It was erroneous. This problem arose due to the nature of the IT system used. It is a good system that is used by all Associations nationwide. It provides a series of modules, each of which controls one element of the Association's online presence.

The module that caused this problem is known as the **Membership Module**. It is designed to not only track details of all members, but also record the subscriptions they pay and the dates each member is required to renew their membership.

As we don't have any subscription fees in the ACT, we don't use the Membership Module for that reason however we had engaged it as it also provides members with a means of logging on to our website. We now no longer use that element as it provides no real value to members.

One module we use that is largely set-and-forget is the **Events Module**. This module holds details of all impending events. You can keep abreast of all events by viewing our [online events page](#).

One of the modules we use in much more detail is the **Email Module**. In this, we maintain several district mailing lists to facilitate ease of communications to various members.

The three main email lists we use are:

- **Newsletters** – Members assigned to this email list receive our monthly newsletters and any "Stop Press" notifications that follow. This list has well over 400 members, some of who are not only nationwide, but also international.
- **Local Events** – Members assigned to this email list are those who generally live or work in the ACT region. This list is used to share reminders for events, typically 3-5 days in advance.
- **General Corps Matters** – Members assigned to this email list receive information of significance to the Corps in general, including information that is time-sensitive. This email group is not used frequently.

We provide provision for members to join the association by requesting general information [online](#).

We also provide an [online form](#) to manage their subscriptions to any of the above email lists. You don't need to be a member of the ACT association to subscribe to any or all of our email lists.

We did however have a minor hiccup in the system with a couple of members reporting they had made changes to their entry in the different email lists but it didn't seem to have changed. This has now been reviewed and changes made so everyone should be up to date. If you observe any future errors, please don't hesitate to let me know.

On 21 May, REME RHQ hosted the final of the Engineering Cup, an engineering challenge for technical college students.


Over the course of eight months over 150 students from eight colleges across the South of England worked in teams to tackle an engineering project based around the CrARRV armoured recovery vehicle.

ACT TRANSPORT OPTIONS FOR STUDENTS

The ACT Government recently announced a [student transport program](#) that provides students of many Defence members with free public transport services.

The student transport program is for eligible primary, high school and college students. It provides free travel on Transport Canberra services from Monday to Friday during the school term.



Eligibility

To be eligible for free travel on Transport Canberra services the student must:

- have a [MyWay+ account](#) in the name of the student with a unique email address (with a linked MyWay+ travel card if using to travel*)
- be able to prove the student (or their parent or guardian) hold one of the following benefit cards:
 - a valid Pensioner Concession Card issued by the Australian Government which shows the applicant's name
 - a valid Health Care Card issued by the Australian Government which shows the student applicant's name
 - a valid Department of [Veterans' Affairs Health Care card](#)
- use the same residential address listed on the benefit card on the student transport program application

- be aged between 5 to 19 years, ACT residents and be either:
 - primary school students living outside a one kilometre radius of their school, or
 - high school, college or CIT year 12 equivalent students living outside a 2 kilometre radius from their campus.

Please notify 13 17 10 if a student changes schools during the year.

The student transport program will not address claims for travel based on any other circumstances.

* A student can use a MyWay+ travel card with a student concession (or other preferred contactless payment method) while waiting for approval of their Student Transport Program application. The student can also use the card to travel on weekends and during school holidays. Remember to link the MyWay+ travel card or other contactless payment method, as well as register the concession type, in the student's [MyWay+ account](#) to receive the correct fare when travelling.



Applications

To apply complete the [Student Transport Program online form](#).

Applications are free and should be submitted 4 to 6 weeks before the school term begins. This allows time for the application to be processed before the start of the term.

TWO NATIONALITIES (From Page 4)

A soldier with two nationalities, British and Italian, figured in a district court martial in Adelaide.

According to evidence the soldier was born in Italy and came to Australia where his father became a naturalised British subject. The son joined the Army in 1941 and on attaining his majority, filled in a declaration for aliens and renounced his British nationality.

He is Corporal Patrick Carbone, who was charged with having been AWOL from May 6 to May 18. On May 18, according to the evidence, he was arrested at his own request in civilian clothes at his home at Findon. He pleaded guilty.

Counsel for the defence suggested that the court discharge Carbone from the Army.

The prosecuting counsel asked that he be transferred to a non-combatant unit. The Court's decision will be promulgated later.

100 FORTRESSES. ROAR OVER NAPLES IN DAYLIGHT

THE Allied air blitz in the Mediterranean continued yesterday with unrelenting intensity. Naples was bombed heavily. One hundred Flying Fortresses roared over Naples in daylight and delivered a four-pronged attack with devastating results.

One formation concentrated on the dock area and marshalling yards. Two other formations bombed airfields just outside Naples. The fourth formation scored direct hits on a large aero-engine plant. One of the Fortress formations was attacked by 50 Axis fighters from the sides and above, where an attempt was made to bomb them. The fighters were beaten off by terrific fire-power and 10 were shot down. Fifty Liberators bombed an airfield 80 miles north-east of Leghorn, destroying large transports on the ground. The raid on Naples was its 64th this war.

Italian Admissions

Rome is beginning to let news of the great damage to Italian and island cities slip out, says the London "Evening Standard." News from other sources supports Rome accounts and discloses growing fears of an invasion. "Giorale, d'Italia" publishes an article, on the raids on Naples, which says "More or less all parts of the city have suffered from bomb attacks. Since the first raid against the city, Neapolitans have spent over 250 hours in air raid shelters."

Vichy Radio declares that the whole of the residential area of Catania, in Sicily, has been destroyed, and Rome Radio admits damage at Reggio di Calabria, in Southern Italy.



Mechanical Ingenuity at a Prisoner of War Camp: Arthur Purdon and the Changi Artificial Limb Factory



After the fall of Singapore on 15 February 1942, Changi became home to some 15,000 Australian prisoners of war. Internees of Changi displayed ingenuity and resourcefulness during their imprisonment, establishing facilities including a prison library, a university, soap factory, rubber factory, pottery manufacture and broom manufacture. Also established within the prison camp was an artificial limb factory, the result of Arthur Henry Mason Purdon's hard work and motivation.




Arthur Henry Mason Purdon, 1945.



2/30th Battalion War Diary entry noting Purdon's actions at Gemas


Arthur Purdon was born in Sydney in 1900 and served as a member of the 2/30th Battalion. He was awarded a Distinguished Conduct Medal for his bravery during an overwhelming Japanese attack in the Gemas area on 16 January 1942. The last person to leave the battlefield, Purdon remained in danger to assist wounded men, while being subjected to enemy fire.

Before the war, Arthur Purdon worked as a health inspector. His experience gave him the skills to establish the artificial limb factory. The factory was born out of necessity; due to disease within the camp, amputations took place. The factory was established alongside the convalescent depot building, which was used for rehabilitation of individuals who had lost limbs.




Selarang Barracks compound.

Purdon's factory was resourceful. Materials and tools were improvised using scrap metals from Japanese dumps and repurposed items; a drilling machine was made using the ironwork of a stretcher, a jigsaw was powered by a refrigerator motor, and some artificial feet were made from spruce from a billiard table. Other materials repurposed for use as part of artificial limbs included bolts from cars, aluminium from kettles, and split angle iron from steel cupboards.

As described in the diary of Private Francis Russell James Day, a fellow Changi internee, the factory began slowly. Day described its beginnings on 2 April 1943, stating that “at the rate they’re going the 35th man will get his in about 1947”.



Diary of Francis Russell James Day, noting the establishment of the artificial limb factory


While Purdon and his comrades faced some initial struggles, trial and error allowed them to perfect and refine their manufacturing techniques. During his factory work, Purdon invented the Purdon Joint, designed to allow limbs to move similarly to a normal leg. Practical use of the artificial limbs was monitored. The use of a limb started at one hour a day, allowing the stump on the amputated limb to harden, with practice allowing the wearer to eventually walk naturally, without the aid of a walking stick.

Prisoners of war missing limbs came together for rehabilitation at the convalescent depot, which focused on

improving capabilities and healing. Sports such as golf, cricket, basketball, volleyball and tennis were a popular form of rehabilitation. When it was discovered that falls caused pain in the amputated limbs of individuals, a warrant officer who knew ju-jitsu, set about training his peers to fall in a safer manner.

Individuals with amputations above the knee often had trouble adapting to the artificial limbs, which were longer and heavier to wear. A daily parade was established to encourage those who struggled to practice wearing their artificial limbs without crutches.

Lieutenant Colonel Robert Webster of the Australian Army Medical Corps noted, “the force here and the limbless are very much indebted to ... Purdon. He has been most practical, ingenious and arduous in his untiring energies at all times, never sparing himself in the problems to be worked out.”

The digitised diaries of the 2/30th Battalion, with details of Purdon’s bravery at Gemas, as well as those of Private Francis Russell James Day and Lieutenant Colonel Robert M.W. Webster, offer a fascinating insight into the artificial limb factory.


Services. Services provided by VSC include, but are not limited to:




