Suffice to say that MAJGEN Powell will be remembered as a RAEME officer who walked his talk 'every member needs to exercise skill and dedication to achieve the results required'.

VALE MAJGEN DOUG POWELL

The strength of RAEME as a Corps has been built throughout our history by men and women with great intellect, passion and a vision. One such man was Major General Arthur Douglas Powell, or Doug as he was known to his friends. On 12 Aug 2024, General Powell left our ranks, aged 94 years old. His funeral was held in Box Hill, Victoria on Monday 19 Aug. It was a small but humble service with no fuss as General Powell had requested.

General Powell was born in Ballarat on 19 Nov 1929. Armed with a Diploma in Electrical Engineering from the Ballarat School of Mines, in 1952 a younger General Powell debated whether he should join the Tasmanian Hydro Scheme (where he had been accepted) or if he should join the Army. He made his decision for the latter and for that, we are thankful. Clearly a year of big decisions, General Powell also wed Beverley



in 1952. He adored her until her passing in 2004. General Powell is now at rest, re-united with his beloved Beverley.

As a Direct Entry Officer, General Powell was commissioned as a LT in 1953 and commenced his first posting at the Southern Command Workshop before moving on to the 3rd Base Workshop Battalion later in the same year. Following promotion to CAPT in 1956, General Powell enjoyed a range of postings, including within the Director of EME's office followed by a few years in the UK for Specialist Engineering Training. In 1961, General Powell was promoted to Major. He commenced a Diploma in Production Engineering at RMIT. He was promoted to LTCOL in 1967 and appointed as the Assistant Director of Electrical and Mechanical Engineers. In 1969, he was then attached to the NZ Army as their Director of EME. Promotion to COL came in 1974. In 1977, General Powell was promoted to BRIG and posted as the Director General of EME (DGEME); the position he held in the above photo. In this role, General Powell welcomed the first ever edition of *The RAEME Craftsman* magazine, in which he recognised our Corps greatest asset was our Craftsmen, calling on them all to be resourceful, versatile and always learning. In 1982, General Powell became the first RAEME officer to be both promoted to MAJGEN and appointed as Chief of Supply. He was one of only a few officers who had not graduated from RMC to reach that rank; a remarkable achievement! Retiring from the Army in late-1984, General Powell's service continued in the Australian Public Service. General Powell held RAEME dearly throughout; referring to himself not as a "military officer" but as a "RAEME officer."

Retirement gave General Powell the time needed for his other passions; his family and friends. He adored every moment he spent with them, especially when he could support them to achieve whatever they strove for. He was quite a family man who cared for them all deeply.

Whilst General Powell's passing is a somewhat sombre moment, it is also worth reflecting on some of the more humorous parts of his career. One of our members shared a story of a time from the late 70s or early 80s when, General Power and his wife were in attendance at a RAEME Birthday Parade. The Parade Ground was below an elevated area in which the spectators assembled. A young lady photographer tried to get into various positions to capture some photos of the parade however her choice of light clothing and a well-timed breeze meant she left little for the imagination of all of the soldiers on parade as well as many of the spectators. General Powell however had



been facing the parade; hence he had no idea why so many of the soldiers started to smile or why the spectators were laughing. At the reception after the parade, General Powell asked a group of diggers about their good humour and their repeated comments about the photographer. At that point his wife commented, "Don't worry, Dear. I will tell you when we get home". It was clear that Mrs Powell had experienced the unexpected show as well!

Rest in peace, Sir.

SEIZING THE OPPORTUNITY OF THE ROYAL COMMISSION INTO DEFENCE AND VETERAN SUICIDE

Earlier this year I gave evidence during the final hearing block of the Royal Commission into Defence and Veteran Suicide. For three years, the Royal Commission has heard evidence from serving and former-serving members, and their families. The Royal Commission has examined extensive data and sought expert testimony.

The Royal Commission has noted that for most Soldiers¹, service in our Army is a positive aspect of their personal and professional lives. This is an important point to acknowledge but that is not what this Royal Commission is about. It is about those for whom service has been a negative experience, the effects of which have been life-long, life-altering and in the worst-case life-ending. The Royal Commission has heard of many such experiences, historic and recent. Our failings – whether institutional or individual - have had terrible consequences for those we have failed.

The evidence is compelling. Since 2017, for example, we know we have lost 30 serving Soldiers either suspected or confined to have died by suicide². Many more have been lost across our wider community.

This is not acceptable. We must do more. These are **our** people, members of our teams and our Army. To fight and win in war our teams must be built on the foundations of trust, respect, and cohesion.

Last year we identified and brought home the remains of Australian soldiers who were killed in the battle of Fromelles in 1916. This reminds us all that 'Lest we Forget' is not rhetoric, it is a **promise**. We continued the search for our soldiers for over a century, a commitment of which we ought to be proud.

Now is the time to apply the same approach and effort to the challenge of suicide and suicidality among our people. We will not leave our mates behind, fallen on their own personal battlefield.

This Royal Commission presents us with a once in a generation opportunity to reduce the incidence of suicide and suicidality in our community. To make a step change rather than incremental improvement. It is both our individual and collective obligation to do so.

I am ultimately accountable for Army's people, culture, mission and resources, but like everything we do - it requires a committed team effort if we are to be successful.

¹ 'Soldier' - refers to all whom have worn and wear our uniform today, regardless of rank.

² This figure is according to statistics compiled for the Defence suicide database. While I acknowledge that this number does not represent the entirety with a connection to Army who are either suspected or confirmed to have died by suicide, this number does provide a sobering reminder of the impact that suicide and suicidality have had, and continue to have, on those who serve in our Army and their families.

CHIEF OF ARMY LETTER Continued

We need not wait for the Royal Commission to publish its findings and recommendations before we act. The opportunity exists today, and we must act on it today.

We will focus on three outcomes: achieving a measurable reduction in the incidence of suicide and suicidality amongst Soldiers; building our individual and collective resilience; and strengthening our culture³. When we achieve this, we will have a stronger Army, an Anny that is more capable and better able to fulfil its mission.

We must move on this effort together, as one team, and we must stay together. We train and fight in teams. Trust among our teams is our main effort.

I am grateful for all that you and your families do in service each day. I am proud to serve in an Army that owns its failures; an Army that is genuinely determined to learn from the past and committed to improving our future.

Our Army's future begins today - with each of us reflecting our values in our thoughts, words and actions today and every day.

Regimental Pathway - Building future RSMs

As a Corps, we have bounced around this concept since 2001 (original concept of pathway presented to Corps Conference). In 2018 we revisited the concept, which outlined the who/what/where/when and why, yet here I am rethinking and providing guidance. Now this is not a shot at anyone, nor disparaging any work previously conducted, we have just failed to keep to momentum.

RAEME (unlike Arms corps) does not have a specified regimental pathway, we rely on those previously filling regimental roles to take those that express an interest under our wing and foster them.

In order to be appointed as an RSM, a WO2 or WO1 must have completed the following:

- a. any career development courses including the RSMs course
- b. minimum of one regimental posting as a CSM/BSM/SSM
- c. have entered the PCZ for promotion to WO1 (WO2 only)

A previous All Corps instructional posting as a CPL, SGT or WO2 at ATW, ARTC, WO & NCO Academy or RMC is highly desirable. The Corps RSMS can provide more information if required. Reach out so he can assist as much as he can.

WHAT'S HAPPENING IN RNZEME - NEW ZEALAND

The big news from across the ditch is the NZ Army has just appointed a new Chief of Army; MAJGEN Rose King.

The even bigger news is that General King is not only the first woman to be appointed a service chief across all of New Zealand's armed forces, but she is also the first to reach the rank of Major General. On top of all of that, General King is also a member of the former Royal New Zealand Electrical and Mechanical Engineers (RNZEME)!!!

General King said ""When I first joined, I couldn't join certain areas of our organisation based on my gender, but now that's open to everyone." General King had previously been Deputy Chief of the Army and had been acting in the top role since June. She said she brought a different approach to leadership as a woman and mother of two. "Perhaps that empathy piece. That's a little bit of a point of difference that I bring... Diversity of thought for me is really important and makes us stronger as a team."

A remarkable military journey

General King began her military career in 1991. She joined the Corps of Royal New Zealand Electrical and Mechanical Engineers, and has held diverse roles since then.

In June 2021, General King achieved the rank of Brigadier, a testament to her exemplary leadership and expertise. Following this promotion, she became the Deputy Chief of Army in December 2021, assuming a critical role in the military hierarchy.

As the Deputy Chief of Army, she was responsible for strategic planning, developing innovative strategies, and managing future capabilities. As the Chief of Army, she will continue to play a pivotal role in shaping the NZ Army's direction and ensuring its readiness for future challenges.

Awards of Distinction

Recognized for her exceptional capabilities,

General King previously served as the Special Projects Officer for the Army General Staff. In this role, she undertook vital initiatives to enhance operational effectiveness and drive innovation within the military.

Her remarkable service and unwavering commitment have garnered prestigious awards, including the NATO Meritorious Service Medal, the US Meritorious Service Medal, and the US Army Commendation Medal. These accolades reflect her exceptional contributions and dedication to duty.

She holds a Bachelor of Defence Studies, a Masters of Management Defence Studies, and a Masters of Arts Strategic Studies. These qualifications have equipped her with a comprehensive understanding of defence strategies, management principles, and strategic thinking, enabling her to make informed and effective decisions in her leadership role.





DVA NEWS – VETERAN TRANSITION STRATEGY

The Veteran Transition Strategy, the first of its kind, was released by the Australian Government on 22 August 2023.

The Strategy is a joint initiative between Defence, the Department of Veterans' Affairs (DVA) and the Commonwealth Superannuation Corporation (CSC)—agency partners in the Joint Transition Authority (JTA).

The Strategy aims to align transition stakeholders with a shared vision for what it means for a veteran and their family to transition well.

The Strategy has six priorities:

- Veterans and their families plan and prepare early for their transition;
- Veterans and families are aware of and able to access support appropriate to their needs;
- Families are engaged through transition;
- Veterans and families have access to employment, education and skills opportunities;
- Financial wellbeing for veterans and families; and
- Veterans and families feel supported and recognised.

The priorities outlined in the Strategy were developed following extensive consultation with serving ADF members, veterans, families, ex-service organisations, Commonwealth and state and territory government agencies, academia and industry.

DVA, Defence and CSC are all critical partners in supporting the effective transition of ADF members and families to a predominantly civilian life. Together, we are working to improve the transition experience through the sharing of data, addressing gaps in services, integrating existing services, and influencing new services as they are developed. To this end, a dedicated Transition Branch has been established to drive these efforts within DVA.

Building on the vision outlined in the strategy, initiatives have already been put in place to improve the services and supports available to veterans in transition:

- the skills recognition program, which translates military training to civilian qualifications. (This means ADF
 personnel are better recognised in the civilian workplace for the skills, training and experience they have
 gained in service.)
- improved, individualised support for personnel transitioning
- amendments to Defence Housing rules to allow members to occupy a rent allowance property before they leave the ADF to help them get established in the community they wish to live
- allowances for transitioning ADF members to attend civilian GP appointments to support the handover of any medical care needs from Defence Health to the GP who will manage their health care after transition
- out-of-hours transition coaching to better support families, to be piloted later this year
- expansion of some transition services to be available throughout an ADF member's career.

The strategy and related action plans will evolve as needed, particularly in response to the findings and recommendations of the Royal Commission into Defence and Veteran Suicide. The Veteran Transition Strategy is available on the Defence website.

Transitioning members are able to access DVA's broad service offer, based on their eligibility and circumstances. Veteran Support Officers deliver support and advice about DVA benefits and services, including MyService and lodging of claims, in a consistent manner tailored to the needs of the individual. Veterans and families can also use MyService to do their business online.

Tragically, six Australians lost their lives whilst deployed, or as a result of their service, in Timor-Leste.

Showcasing a powerful collection of career imagery and accompanying stories from Australian veterans, this exhibition brings a voice to the unique experiences of serving personnel. From its Tasmanian beginnings in 2020, *Point & Shoot* launched onto the national stage in 2022 and



continues to grow. Covering military service from post-World War II onwards, the exhibition commemorates a range of modern conflicts, peace operations and service and provides a rare glimpse into the life and experiences of fellow Australians who have served their country.

Point & Shoot is the concept of Point Assist founder Mark Direen, a former Infantry and Special Forces soldier with over 20 years military service including 6 overseas deployments. Mark's own experiences as a soldier were the impetus for this project.

Operating in remote, high-threat environments is both physically and mentally demanding. It was behind the lens of a camera, capturing both the ordinary and extraordinary experiences as a combat soldier he found stillness and meaning. Looking back at a plethora of images post service, Mark then began to wonder, maybe others do this too and so the concept began.

The purpose of the *Point & Shoot* exhibition is not to display perfectly captured photos from professional photographers. But rather, to share some of those moments frozen in time that those who serve our nation thought were worth

DVA NEWS – APPLICATIONS OPEN FOR LONG TAN BURSARY

Today we honour Vietnam veterans, by supporting the future of their children and grandchildren through the 2025 Long Tan Bursary. Applications are now open to eligible children and grandchildren of Vietnam veterans, who can apply for up to \$12,000 over 3 years to assist with the cost of their education.

Each year, 37 Long Tan Bursaries are awarded. They provide education support to recipients, helping them to acquire qualifications in their chosen careers. The Long Tan Bursary scheme is named after the Battle of Long Tan, the best-known battle fought by Australians during the Vietnam War.

Vietnam veterans were instrumental in setting up the Long Tan Bursary more than 20 years ago. The Bursary is funded by DVA and administered by the Australian Veterans' Children Assistance Trust (AVCAT¹) on the Department's behalf. So far, the Bursary has supported 967 children and grandchildren of Vietnam veterans. It has helped aspiring doctors, teachers, lawyers, artists, mechanics and many others succeed in their chosen professions.

Julia Clugston, whose father served in Vietnam, received a Long Tan Bursary in 2019.

'Without [the Bursary], I would not have been here with a finished university degree, driving around national parks fighting fires and seeing a good vision for the future with my career,' she said last year. 'I have had the great opportunity of meeting people from AVCAT from all around and being mentored and supported by them. I feel like I could not be in safer hands.'

Leon Ross is multimedia composer who was awarded the Long Tan Bursary in 2018. The Bursary helped him complete a Bachelor of Applied Music before going on to study overseas.

'[My] goals take extreme dedication, perseverance and quite possibly a lot of support in coping with rejections,' said Leon. 'AVCAT has provided me a mental stabiliser of sorts, allowing me to focus on my aspirations and act on them to bring them to fruition. Thank you, AVCAT, and all for the countless support throughout my growth as a composer.'

To apply, visit the AVCAT website³. Applications close on 31 October 2024

Eligibility. To be eligible for a Long Tan Bursary, you must:

- be the child or grandchild of an Australian veteran who served in the Vietnam War during 31 July 1962 to 30 April 1975
- have Australian residency status
- plan to enrol, or be enrolled, in post-secondary education at an Australian University, TAFE College or Registered Training Organisation
- be studying, or planning to study full time, either online or face-to-face
- qualify for continuous payment of educational benefits under Youth Allowance or a comparable Commonwealth educational benefit, for example Abstudy or Austudy.

You can only receive this bursary once. You cannot apply again if you have already received this bursary. The Long Tan Bursary is not available to students undertaking professional training, such as the College of Law. Each course must approved by AVCAT.


ADF NEWS - 3D PRINTERS BREATHE LIFE INTO MEDICAL TRAINING

When damaged or blocked airways stop a patient breathing, medics can cut through the cricothyroid membrane and insert a valve to make an alternate airway in the throat.

This procedure, known as a cricothyrotomy, was added to the medic's scope of practice two years ago, but training aids were hard to come by and replacement consumables expensive.

Increasing costs quickly became a problem for instructors at the ADF School of Health, and with nothing available through the Q system, one instructor, Sergeant John Bray, found a solution.

Listening to a podcast by an American doctor who specialises in teaching the procedure, he learned the doctor had created a free 3D-printable training aid.

Sergeant Bray took the designs to the MakerSpace at Latchford and spent the next few days printing different components.

"It was a case of print it off, glue it together, find something to use as a piece of skin and you're ready to roll," Sergeant Bray said.

What emerged was a head on a hinge that flips back and exposes a piece of rubber used to simulate skin over a plastic trachea.

"You slice through that fake skin to get to the trachea so you can insert an airway and ventilate with a bag-value mask," Sergeant Bray said.

The procedure can be needed following explosive blasts, burns or any injury that causes trauma to the head where an airway is blocked.

Instructors replace the training aid's skin with skin from worn medical mannequins, but everything else is permanent.

"We've been using it on the CBRN (chemical, biological, radiological and nuclear) health course since July last year, where it's getting thrown around. In the rotarywing aero-medical evacuation course it's been stepped on a few times; it's actually pretty durable," Sergeant Bray said. He next plans to use the MakerSpace equipment to create an improvised explosive device noise simulator to make a blast sound to trigger the start of a trauma scenario.

"The people that are running MakerSpace are happy to help out, but they're more interested in helping people learn to do it themselves," Sergeant Bray said. "It's not there for people to go in and ask the staff to print off knick-knacks; they're helping personnel to learn the technology."

ADF NEWS - WELDING COURSE JOINS FRIENDS TOGETHER

Army personnel from 3rd Brigade conducted training with their Papua New Guinea Defence Force (PNGDF) counterparts recently to develop a variety of military skills.

As part of Exercise Olgeta Warrior, a welding course was held at Murray Barracks, Port Moresby.

The two-month course focused on welding techniques used on all types of materials, including stainless steel and aluminium.

The course instructor,

material technician Sergeant Travis Doll, of 3rd Combat Service Support Battalion, said the course ensured the PNGDF had the capability to weld their ships.

"They have been learning how to use the new welding machines and the dissimilar techniques for different situations, and not just using a stick welder to weld everything," Sergeant Doll said.

A marine engineer from the PNGDF, Ordinary Seaman Mervan Gau, said the course was great.

"It's good to get extra training, specifically on the aluminium side to welding, as we conduct lots of this at the Navy base," Ordinary Seaman Gau said.

"This course has broadened my understanding of welding with different types of materials.

"I'm loving every day; it makes me want to come to work."

"The friendship that has been formed between the PNGDF welders' course members and me has been amazing.



AWM NEWS – 30TH ANNIVERSARY OF THE FIRST AUSTRALIAN TROOPS TO ARRIVE IN RWANDA

There was little that Australians could do to prepare themselves adequately for what they would encounter in Rwanda. In early 1994 the tiny East African country had been the site of one of the most concentrated genocides of the twentieth century. In the space of just three months, an estimated 800,000 men, women and children, mostly from the Tutsi ethnic group, were massacred by extremist Hutu militias. Machete was the most common weapon; churches provided no refuge; and former friends, neighbours, community leaders and school teachers took part in the violence.

A UN peacekeeping force, the United Nations Assistance Mission for Rwanda (UNAMIR), was established in 1993 as tension escalated in the country, but the force did not have adequate resources to stem the increasing violence nor to stop the genocide. Australia did not participate in UNAMIR, but did contribute to the second iteration of the mission, dubbed UNAMIR II, an expansion on the original UN mission



starting in May 1994. Australia's contribution was Operation Tamar, in which some 656 ADF personnel served in two contingents to Rwanda between August 1994 and August 1995.

When the Advance Party of Australians beg an to arrive in Rwanda on 7 August 1994, the first main task was to prepare the military wing of the Kigali Central Hospital for use as a working health centre. This would become a main base of Australian operations for the next year. The hospital had been damaged in the civil war, and during the genocide it had become a shelter for hundreds of desperate refugees. The Advance Party found the hospital covered in months of accumulated filth; it had no power, water, or working sewerage system. The toilets, lacking running water, needed to be cleared of solidified excrement, and the gas masks worn by those tasked with their clearance did little to assist. The hospital morgue, which had no power and therefore no refrigeration, needed to be cleared of human remains.

In a little over a week, the hospital wing was nearly ready, and before long the main body of Australian medical staff and infantry began to arrive. Although they were in the country principally to provide health care to the 40 nation strong UN mission, the Australians used their spare capacity to assist the civilian population as well. The Australian medical staff found themselves treating a variety of cases that were unfamiliar to many in the medical profession in Australia: mine blasts, gunshot wounds, and rare diseases. By early 1995 it was estimated that the Australians were providing 50 per cent of Rwanda's primary health care needs.

Although the Australians had arrived in Rwanda after the civil war and genocide, the country was not completely free of violence. In Kigali, it was not uncommon for Australian medics to treat people suffering wounds from beatings, to hear gunshots during the night, or to find beaten and bound bodies left in rubbish dumps. Hutu militias continued deadly attacks on civilians, and the Australians assisted by treating the wounded in the aftermath. Similarly, the Tutsi-dominated Rwandan Patriotic Army carried out reprisal attacks on Hutus, including Hutu civilians returning home from camps across the countryside. The continued violence made the process of returning Rwanda to some sense of normality difficult. Australian troops providing security for the Australian medical team had frequent run-ins and stand-offs with the increasingly hostile Rwandan troops, many of whom resented the international presence in their country so soon after they had emerged victorious from the civil war.

In January 1995, Australians of the first contingent investigated a massacre at Busanze; and in April 1995, 32 Australians of the second contingent were present at the Internally Displaced Persons camp at Kibeho when Rwandan government troops opened fire on mostly Hutu civilians, killing an estimated 4,000 of them in a single day. The Kibeho Massacre has become a defining event for the Australian experience in Rwanda, and four Australians were awarded Medals for Gallantry for their efforts to protect and treat the wounded on that day; but it was only one of many traumatic events for the more than 600 Australians who served in Rwanda over the course of a year.

Few who served in Rwandan came home unaffected by the scenes they had encountered and the hardships they had endured.


member. This includes the standard housing and allowances benefits but also goes towards enhancement of skill sets, payment of memberships to technical organisations and both professional and personal development

MAJOR VICTORY AT MILNE BAY **Australian Troops Drive** Japs From Area; Capture All Equipment, Supplies

MAJOR VICTORY AT MILNE BAY -Australian Troops Drive Japs from Area; Capture All Equipment, Supplies

The battle at Milne Bay (south-east tip of New Guinea) has resulted in a major victory for our forces. Australian troops, supported by American and Australian aircraft, have defeated the enemy and are now pursuing the remnants of the Japanese troops along the peninsular on the northern side of the. Bay. The enemy suffered heavy casualties and lost all their equipment and supplies, including tanks. Some of the Japs are believed to have escaped during the night on naval craft.

The cruiser and eight transports which entered Milne Bay on Saturday night and were at first thought to be landing, reinforcements, were probably sent there to evacuate the Japanese ground force.

Other warships were sighted and our, planes went out the following morning searching for the enemy but could not locate him.

General MacArthur told of the victory in a special statement issued yesterday morning. He said that the enemy at Milne Bay has been rapidly cleared from the area by Australian troops, ably commanded by, Major-General Cyril Clowes, DSC, MC, and brilliantly supported by American and Australian aircraft.

Our forces have thrown the enemy back to the remaining confines of the peninsular on the northern side of the bay.

Heavy casualties were inflicted on the enemy and all his equipment and supplies, including tanks, were lost.

At some stage, most RAEME members wonder what the heck happens at Army HQ, including people who are posted there! Back in Edition 4 of *The RAEME Craftsman* magazine from May 1980, someone thought it was worth sharing what happens. I'm not so sure much has changed....or maybe it has!



ARMY OFFICE JOTTINGS

RAEME IN ARMY OFFICE EXPLAINED

by WO1 Warren Wilde

After three issues of "The RAEME Craftsman" it occurred to me that the fourth may be the most suited to clarifying the role of RAEME in the Army Office. I am certain there are many members of the Corps who understand as much about this subject as I did — before being posted into Army Office.

As far as our Corps is concerned, Army Office consists of three areas, namely DGEME, Defence Central and the rest. The role within each area is as different as you could imagine. The ensuing brief descriptions of the areas and the sub-areas will, I hope, help you achieve a more complete understanding of RAEME's contribution.

DGEME looks after the organisation and planning aspects of the Corps, or, in officialese:

"Formulates Army policies in relation to equipment repair and maintenance. Responsible for the technical control of the Army equipment repair and maintenance services through functional commands and military districts. Performs Head of Corps functions for the Royal Corps of Australian Electrical and Mechanical Engineers. Provides technical advice on equipment and repair and maintenance matters. Exercises financial delegations alloted."

DGEME is divided into several section, which are:

- Office of the Director General of Electrical and Mechanical Engineers.
- Directorate Management Section.
- Operations and Organisation Section, which "Co-ordinates EME operations, organisations, establishments, contingency planning, war and mobilisation planning, static and

mobile workshop equipment and facilities planning and development. Monitors arrangements involving DGEME and other Directorates/Branches of Army Office, Maintenance Engineering Agency and other sources used by DGEME in the course of policy formulation on Corps management."

- Personnel Employment Section "responsible for the management of personnel of the Corps of RAEME; Trade Structures; Trade Management, including Civil Schooling and the co-ordination of training of RAEME personnel with other services and civilian establishments."
- Systems, Production and Finance Section develops, implements and monitors "manual and EDP management systems for the control of RAEME repair and maintenance functions. Assists with the formulation of major repair programme policy and planning. Provides input to and coordinates management of the Army portion of the defence repair and overhaul vote."
- Inspection and Defence Co-operation Projects Section "Formulates and co-ordinates policy for DGEME in relation to; effectiveness of engineering support plans, adequacy of trade standard, technical documentation, quality control measures, compliance with engineering practices and Corps instructions (and) the correct exercise of financial delegation and management. Supervise and direct work in relation to Defence Co-operation projects."
- Maintenance Engineering Liaison Section (Maintenance Engineering Agency, Canberra Element). "The Maintenance Engineering Liaison Section provides direct liaison between the DGEME and his staff of the Maintenance Engineering Agency (MEA) and a point contact for Army Office and other Services, Branches and Directorates staffs for all maintenance engineering matters."

Then, there is DEFENCE CENTRAL in which there is a small six member RAEME element as part of the Defence Technical Staff. This is DGEME's "other hat" and, briefly, his duties are to "contribute to the formulation of engineering and maintenance policies common to all Services; formulate Army engineering and maintenance policies and implement Defence Central and Army policies within the Army."

You can take my word for it that RAEME is well represented in such sections as: CSD — Computer Services Division; DGOP — Director General of Operations and Plans (Army); MS PERS — Military Secretary; DSC — Director of Service Conditions; DAEM — Director of Armaments and Electronic Materiel (Army); DVGEM — Director of Vehicles and General Engineering Materiel (Army); DGLOG — Director General of Logistics (Army); DLO — Director of Logistics Operations (Army); DLP — Director of Logistics Plans (Army); DLD — Director of Logistics Development (Army) and DEMPE — Director of Equipment Management, Programming and Estimates (Army).

The positions are not necessarily RAEME positions, however. They may be held by any Corps unless there is a definite need for engineering expertise.

It is in your best interests to learn more of the organisation and roles of your Directorate and Army Office. Your Orderly

Room should be able to give you more information.

So much for your brief tour of Army Office, I cannot resist, however, ending with the statement, provided by a departing member, that RUSSELL OFFICES is a mnemonic for: Ridiculously Underpaid Servicemen Supporting Egotistical Liberal Labourites (RUSSELL) — Often Fiercely Fighting Insufficient Capital Expenditure Suppositions (OFFICES). 
Due to the huge success of the First and Second editions of RAEME's humour book, Straight from the Horse's Mouth a third edition is being drafted now. The editors need more stories!!
