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Our Corps' Formation

On 01 Oct 1942, the capability of the UK Defence Force was enhanced by the formation of the Royal Electrical and Mechanical Engineers or REME as they are known to their friends. The formation of REME was not only established within the British Army's Order of Battle but it was also officially registered with the UK's Registry of Births, Deaths and Marriages. Below is REME's official Birth Certificate. The original Birth Certificate it on display at the REME Museum in the village of Lyneham, Wiltshire UK. In an effort to find something similar for RAEME or even to locate the original Order that directed our Corps' formation, we sought assistance from the historians within the Research Centre of the Australian War Memorial. They were able to find reference to the original General Routine Order but they weren't able to locate a copy of it. They did however suggest we enlist the help of the National Archives of Australia (NAA).

The researchers at the National Archives also had difficulty locating a copy of the original Order. They were however able to locate the first reference to the Corps in one of the earliest editions of the Army Newspaper from December 1942, as shown in the extract image to the right.

Notably, not only was the foundation of AEME announced in the Army Newspaper, but a recruiting call was placed for men who possess the highest standards.

Thanks to the good judgement of our forefathers, the application of such high standards not only ensured our Corps was formed with the best and brightest of the time but by maintaining the same high standards today, we retain our rightful place

Corps RSM's Update continued

Corps Birthday at ASEME. A great RAEME birthday celebration was held at Latchford Barracks. Units from Puckapunyal and Melbourne made the journey up the Hume Highway. Activities began with a 'Trebuchet/Catapult' pineapple toss; some people took the idea to the extreme and built a 'Ballista'. There was also some fantastic food supplied by our gracious vendors. Brad Jones Racing put on a great display and there were strength competitions. EESW took on the win on the 'Billy LARC' race. The day finished by celebrating the achievements of staff, soldiers and aviators with promotions and presentations of various Honours & Awards.

New ECNs. RAEME introduced two new Employment Category Numbers (ECN) – 222 Marine Technician and 034 Technician Assistant. The Manual for Army Employment (MAE) Employment Specifications have been raised, a training continuum actioned, positions created and a short list of people who may be best suited for the ECNs has been built.

DFRT outcomes. The Defence Force Remuneration Tribunal (DFRT) outcomes have been released. These allow for CFN pay changes for some ECNs to align with civil counterparts with similar qualifications.

Defence Strategic Review. The Defence Strategic Review requires a change to everyone's philosophy on how maintenance is to be conducted. 2024 may be challenging, I am extremely confident we as a Corps are up to it.

Corps Conference. At the conclusion of the recent Corps Conference, the RSM raised options for the locations in which the next Conference (Heavy) could be held. It was decided to seek interest from each region to host the conference. This will allow those that have not had the opportunity to attend previously (due to funding or time away from home locations) to now be able to attend. Regional RAEME reps were asked to consider the availability of suitable conference facilities, accommodation and dining facilities in their respective areas. Requests to host the conference are to be sent to the Corps RSM NLT 10 Feb 24. HOC Cell will then decide and release a 'Warning Order' with details of the conference NLT 01 Mar 24. This will allow for planning to be completed well in advance of the conference being conducted.

ANZAC Day 2024

The event with the greatest military significance each year is undoubtedly ANZAC Day.

Pre-COVID, a large RAEME contingent (approx. 40-50+ members) would march behind the Association banner in the National Veteran's March at the Australian War Memorial however during COVID and subsequently due to the construction work at the War Memorial, numbers have typically dropped to less than 20.

This provides us the first opportunity to reform as a large contingent to march behind our banner.

Maximum attendance for this year's ANZAC Day march is therefore highly encouraged, as is our regular gathering at Olims after the parade for drinks, chats and sharing of memories (true or otherwise).

75th Anniversary Reunion Commemorating Formation of the Army Apprentices School

The following was summarised from *The Apprentice About*, Vol 6, Issue 1, Nov 2023.

Over the weekend 20 – 22 October 2023, our Apprentices commemorated 75 years since the 1st Intake of 63 Army Apprentices commenced their training in August 1948 at Balcombe, Victoria, thus establishing the Australian Army Apprentice Scheme and the Army Apprentices School. Concurrent with this commemoration was recognition that, in December 1982/January 1983, trade training for Apprentices began at the newly-built Army Apprentices School at Latchford Barracks, Bonegilla, Victoria. The Albury Entertainment Centre was the venue for the first two days' events, with the last day's events being held at South Bandiana.



The first clue that Apprentices were in town was the wide range of Jon Rogers' "tac signs" displayed on cars (and in at least one hotel lift).



Meet & greet. The meet & greet was scheduled to start at 1600h but some eager beavers turned up at 1350h. After some negotiation, and departure of the venue cleaners, the doors were opened about an hour early and registration and the festivities began. It was reported that the bar ran out of beer, but it turns out that there was a problem with the gas for the beer taps. Canned beer or other drinks became popular. Also popular was Richard Pike's merchandise stand. With his helpers, many items of merchandise were sold. All too soon, 2000h arrived and we were ushered out of the venue.

AGM. At about 1030h on Saturday morning, nearly 100 brave souls ventured out and attended the AGM.

Dinner. About 450 attended a great dinner, with both options for the entree and main courses being well-received. Again, the bar provided challenges but most of those attending were able to quench their thirsts. 


75th Anniversary Reunion Commemorating Formation of the Army Apprentices School continued

Turner led a large group in prayer. Alan then provided an excellent, brief




Apprentices School and the many Army units and Corps to which they were sent on


RAEME Humour Book

In last month's *RAEME in ACTion*, we featured the cover of *The RAEME Craftsman*, Number 2 from 1979 which included a picture of a risk-accepting tradesmen working on a generator next to a drum of fuel whilst smoking.

That article drew quite some interest including from our own Lyell Wedd who as a Crafty in that unit at the time believes the rogue soldier in the picture may actually be him!

Thank you, Lyell, for being one of the reasons all serving members get to enjoy the mandatory safety presentations every year!



It was also indicated to me that these particular generators were notoriously hard to start, hence the need for a trained "mechanician" to be on hand to either get them going or keep them going. Having personally experienced the joy of hand cranking the VW 15KVA in the field (which is a better upper-body workout that any PTI could give you), I totally get this. Likewise, having the drum of fuel nearby allowed the generator to run for extended hours without the need to refuel.
