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Vietnam Veteran's Day 2023

On 18 August 2023, our nation paused to remember the 50th anniversary of Australia's withdrawal from armed conflict in Vietnam and to remember the almost 60,000 who served there as well as the 523 Australians who lost their lives. This occasion was marked with a moving ceremony at the Australian Vietnam Forces National Memorial on Anzac Parade in Canberra. This was observed by thousands of Vietnam Veterans, friends, families and supporters.



During the ceremony and afterwards, several people spoke of the poor manner in which veterans were treated on return to Australia by protestors who expressed strong anti-war sentiments and by older WW2 veterans who considered the Vietnam veterans hadn't fought in a "real" war. That was the attitude of an immature nation; one engaged in an unpopular war yet one which had difficulty separating the brave men and women who served their nation in good faith from a conflict few understood. We were also a nation that showed little consideration of individuals. For some who returned by sea, their individual debriefs came in the weeks at sea from mates with whom they had served. For those that flew home, they had a matter of days, yet few received full debriefings of what they had seen, done or felt.



Since then, our nation has grown up a little. Our PM recently apologised to those who served in Vietnam, roughly 35,000 of whom remain, for their treatment. The Hon Matt Keogh MP, Minister for Defence Personnel and Minister for Veterans' Affairs, noted that whilst hostilities ceased 50 years ago, the battle continued for many on their return and in some cases, continues today. We now try harder to ensure those leaving theatres of war are debriefed.

The Vietnam Veteran Counselling Service (VVCS) was established in 1982 after Vietnam veterans lobbied the Government for specialised counselling and support service for veterans and their families. That has since evolved into

Open Arms, Australia's leading provider of high-quality mental health assessment and clinical counselling services for all Australian veterans and their families.

Whilst some presenters spoke of the pain felt by Vietnam veterans, they also recounted underlying themes of service, pride and mateship. These fundamental elements of service in the Australian military were on clear display at the memorial service. Whilst some of the veterans who were present may not have been as nimble as their younger selves, the pride in their service and love of their mates was clear for all to see. They were challenged with impossible duties yet they faced them whilst combatting enemy forces as well as a harsh environment and exposure to various chemicals. They deservedly reflected on their service with pride.

We recognise Vietnam veterans for the positive lessons we learnt from their negative experience.

We thank Vietnam veterans for being the leaders who established the strong foundation veterans today stand upon.

We are grateful to Vietnam veterans for fighting for the strengthened mental health of veterans today and into the future.

We salute all Vietnam veterans for their service and sacrifice. Arte et Marte.

Vietnam Veteran's Day Programs

Fantastic booklets were available at the Memorial ceremony that include: an historical essay on the Vietnam war, an order of service for the commemoration, a summary of customs and traditions and a roll of honour for those who lost their lives in Vietnam.

Corps Status Update

Memorial to WO2 Ryan Leslie and CFN Brendan Payne. The HOC, DHOC-G and Colonel Commandant Queensland (COL Evans) unveiled the Memorial to WO2 Ryan Leslie and CFN Brendan Payne on 30 Aug 23 in the TFTA. A report from this important event will hopefully follow soon.

V8 Supercars. Thanks to a mountain of work by an ASM, WO1 Munro, several vehicle technicians (formerly called "vehicle mechanics") were integrated into the V8 Supercar Team of Matt Stone Racing. This has now created a flow on effect of other V8 Supercar teams expressing interest in having our technicians embedded within their organisations.

Civilian Placements. The 3 Bde ASM in Townsville has worked tirelessly (with support) to engage with civilian industry in order to gain placements for our technicians. Vehicle Technicians will have an opportunity to nominate for positions (only 3 BDE at this stage). The opportunity for other ECNs is being explored by the ASM.



Corps Shop. The Head of Corps Cell shop has gone through the design process and is at the ordering stage. Hoodies appear to be the hottest item currently for sale.

Craftsman of the Year Awards. Nominations are being called for by HOC Cell. These were due to regional representatives by 01 Sep.

ASEME. In order to reduce training delay within VTW, the school has raised a separate training platoon. The members within the platoon will leave ASEME with more qualifications than any CFN before them. We have agreements to undertake 40M drivers' courses, working at heights certification and dogging to all be completed at the Centre. The intent is to build on this as we progress throughout the remainder of 2023 into 2024, with G-wagon being included (training spots dependant).

Members within VTW, not undertaking training on the floor, are due to begin civilian detachments with JLU(V). This will build on their foundation skills, assist in providing context in vehicle maintenance and allow for the commencement of their skills tracker certifications (perceived this will reduce OJT time at the back end of their apprenticeship).

Workforce & Training Group, Maintenance Cell. Work continues on training for new projects, with IIS Learning Review Boards upcoming for new Joint Counter Radio-Controlled Improvised Explosive Device Electronic Warfare (JCREW) Force Protection Electronic Countermeasures (FPECM) and new medical and dental equipment. Both these maintenance courses will have changes that affect currently qualified Boffins (ECN 421). The trial courses for these updated capabilities will be conducted in Q4 2023.

Makerspace. Makerspace is an Army initiative providing a place for learning-by-making and education in innovative approaches, creative thinking, and agile methodologies. All Army personnel are invited to join their local community of makers to gain a professional toolbox of problem-solving techniques to tackle Army's current and emerging challenges.

Makerspace is part of The Robotic and Autonomous Systems Implementation & Coordination Office (RICO) within Future Land Warfare Branch and contributes to realising a Future Ready workforce.

Makerspace locations have been established at: Irwin Barracks, Perth; Robertson Barracks, Darwin; Edinburgh Defence Precinct, Adelaide; Holsworthy Barracks, Sydney; Gallipoli Barracks, Brisbane; Borneo Barracks, Toowoomba; and Lavarack Barracks, Townsville.

A Makerspace has progressed to site evaluation, looking to 2024 for the installation, at ASEME, Bandiana.

Profile of a former Spanner

In last month's *RAEME in ACTion*, we included a story regarding a tribute being unveiled for the late LTCOL Vivian Bullwinkle AO, MBE, ARRC, ED. One of the lesser-known facts regarding this remarkable lady was her connection to our Corps; she was married to a RAEME Officer, the late COL Francis West Statham, or Frank as he was known to his friends. Frank's daughter, Pamela Stratham-Drew supported compilation of this summary of his life and service.

Francis West Statham (1916–1999), engineer and Army officer, was born on 25 June 1916 at Toowoomba, Queensland and raised on Buki-Buki, Marovo Lagoon, British Solomon Islands Protectorate. He was apprenticed at fourteen to S. T. Leigh & Co. Pty Ltd, a subsidiary of British Tobacco Company (Australia) Ltd, as a fitter and turner. At the same time, he took night classes at Sydney Technical College, graduating with a Diploma in Mechanical Engineering (1939).



On 10 May 1938 Statham joined the part-time Citizen Military Forces (CMF) and was commissioned as a Lieutenant in the Australian Army Ordnance Corps. He transferred to the Australian Imperial Force on 13 November 1939, so becoming one of the early volunteers to serve overseas in World War II. On 9 December that year at St Philip's Church of England, Sydney, he married Hazel Winifred Thompson. A month later, he sailed for the Middle East as Captain, commanding the advance party of the 2/1st Army Field Workshop, 6th Division.

Promoted to Major in December 1940, Frank was posted as Deputy Assistant Director of Ordnance Services at Headquarters 9th Division. He served with that Division through the withdrawal from Benghazi and the siege of Tobruk, Libya. In late 1942, being RAEME's formation year, he returned to Sydney. Now a Lieutenant Colonel, he was made commander of the 2/1st Armoured Troops Workshop and sent to Western Australia. There he was involved in fortifying the north-west, including the construction of airfields and gun emplacements.

In late 1944 Frank was posted to Lae, New Guinea. He was praised for work as Assistant Deputy Director of Mechanical Engineering of II Corps (May-June 1945) and the First Army (August-September 1945), and for having developed a repair technique to prolong the life of equipment. In October he returned to Sydney and was transferred to the Reserve of Officers. He was appointed OBE in 1947 for his 'consistent outstanding display of ability and leadership' (NA WO373/65). After the war, Frank would serve part time with the CMF in Victoria (1948 and 1955–61); he was later Colonel Commandant, Royal Australian Electrical and Mechanical Engineers, Western Australia (1976–82).

On retiring from the Army, Frank was promoted to Director of Works for the Western Australian region in April 1965, and moved to Perth. His primary task was to oversee the planning and construction of HMAS Stirling, the naval base on Garden Island. He would be responsible for many other projects including the Commonwealth Centre Taxation Building and the Wellington Telephone Exchange, as well as works at the Royal Australian Air Force Base, Pearce, and at the Campbell and Irwin Army Barracks, Perth. The naval base, and the causeway connecting it to the mainland, remained a source of personal pride. For periods in 1974 and 1975 Frank was Acting Deputy Secretary of the Department and was called on to coordinate its relief efforts after Cyclone Tracy struck Darwin.

In February 1977 Hazel died of cancer. On 16 September, Frank married Vivian Bullwinkel. He encouraged her to recount her story as the sole survivor of the massacre of nurses by Japanese forces on Banka Island, Netherlands East Indies (Indonesia), in 1942. While accompanying Vivian to Canberra for the unveiling of the Australian Service Nurses National Memorial in October 1999, Frank became seriously ill, and was repatriated to Perth. Survived by his ailing wife (d. 2000), and the son and daughter of his first marriage, Frank died on 3 December 1999 at Bicton, Perth.

A life of service to be remembered. Lest we Forget.

Time for an introduction into some cutting-edge test equipment as reviewed in Edition 2 of *The RAEME Craftsman* Magazine, May 1979

AUTOMATIC TEST EQUIPMENT

In industry there is a trend toward introducing Automatic Test Equipment for the purpose of detecting and isolating failures in, and the specification testing of, complex printed circuit boards, or cards, especially where substantial quantities of such items are prevalent in equipments.

As a consequence of this trend, Automatic Test Equipment (ATE) is being introduced into military service in many countries in support of weapon and communication systems such as Rapier, Surface to Air Guided Weapons, the Clansman communication system and Electronic Warfare (EW) systems.

ATE is essentially a *set* of electronic test equipment, similar to that used by a technician in any electronic or telecommunication repair facility, rack mounted and arranged such that each piece of test equipment is connected, through sets of 'electronic switches', to a central console. Usually the console is centrally located on the ATE to provide a central facility into which the PEC under test can be fitted to facilitate testing.

Fault diagnosis with ATE saves time and manpower. It also offers, with the aid of appropriate software packages, a multi-system support facility thereby implying further time and manpower savings.

The implications of employing ATE in a military environment can be better realised by understanding the characteristics of the quipment. To achieve this it is necessary to first consider current forms of electronic test equipment, their purpose and the manner in which they are used

All electronic test equipment can be divided into two broad categories.

In the first category there are test equipments which provide an input, or source, stimulus to, say, a Printed Electronic Circuit (PEC) under test. Such input sources include power supplies, squarewave generators, signal generators and the like. Their purpose is to stimulate an output or response from the PEC under test.

The second category encompasses those test equipments which monitor or measure the output response of the PEC once it has been stimulated. Power meters, voltmeters and ammeters are included in this category.

A technician engaged in a fault diagnosis follows a prescribed set of instructions, applies an appropriate input stimulus and looks for an output response that is within pre-determined tolerances. If the response is within those tolerances the equipment is serviceable. If not, it is repaired, realigned and retested — or rejected altogether. In carrying out this procedure a technician will have used equipments from both test equipment categories. The same procedures and the same test equipments are used to diagnose faults in the same type of equipment throughout the Army by numerous technicians.

The automatic application of such test equipment in a fault diagnosis situation also follows a prescribed set of instructions, applies an appropriate input stimulus and 'looks' for the same indications of serviceability status as the technician. However, to do this, a pre-determined sequence of electronic switching is involved which, to ensure consistency, is pre-programmed.

Typically, pre-programming takes the form of a 'punched' paper, or magnetic, tape. The tape is prepared to provide a complete set of instructions to diagnose all possible faults that could reasonably be expected to occur on one particular PEC. Further tapes can also be prepared to cater for PECs in any electronic equipment and a library of such tapes established.

It is evident that weapon and communication systems introduced into the service could each have their own customised ATE complete with tape library and other software items such as patch and extender boards to cater for any size or shape differences in PECs; interconnecting cables to suit special PEC inputs or outputs; an instruction manual for the ATE operator; circuit and component location diagrams for each PEC in the related equipment, test specifications, parts lists of components, samples of correct ATE printouts and any other related data.

ATE facilities, by virtue of their pre-programming tapes are adaptable and could, therefore, be utilised for a wide range of electronic equipments and sited at field or base repair agencies, or, in some cases, both.

So far, ATE have been discussed in terms of time and manpower saving and their adaptability. There are, however, disadvantages.

They are, by nature, very expensive and could cause a tendency for repairs to be conducted at a centralised location. Also, as modifications to related equipments are incorporated, appropriate amendments will be required to the relevant 'software packages'. To achieve such amendments an additional requirement emerges to provide trained personnel to carry out this task.



The maintenance effort for the software package, to keep abreast of the modification state of its related equipment, will necessitate the acquisition of new skills in relation to updating and amending programmed instructions. It is envisaged that, once acquired by a core of engineers and technicians, such skills would facilitate the production of software packages suitable for interfacing PECs from a wide range of equipment to ATE already in existence.

The Rapier SAGW is supported by ATE. However, the quantity of Rapiers being purchased for the Australian Army suggest that the Rapier ATE will be under-utilised.

In UK, 35 Central Workshop, the base repair facility for Rapier, has a significantly greater equipment dependency than we have. There the ATE facility is operated for two eight-hour shifts on a five day a week basis; is utilised by the manufacturer, British Aircraft Corporation (UK) for the testing of future Test Package software and by the staff of the workshop who have developed a number of software packages for the fault diagnosing and specification testing of FACE. This may have application for Australian FACE support and we are taking advantage of this fact.

Further consideration could be also given to providing software packages for other equipment systems such as the PECs in, say, the Leopard Tank Fire Control system and other systems likely to be introduced into the service.

However, it would be quite wrong to continually load the Rapier ATE in support of an ever-increasing number of weapon and communication systems. Another solution, in time, is desirable.

The expense of purchasing ATE for the support of complex systems can be justified from many points of view.

If ATEs are available proposed electronic equipments of the future could be specified in such a manner that software packages could be developed and delivered with the new equipment. Rationalisation and standardisation of equipments with a view to full utilisation of ATEs could be extended to achieve improved tri-service economic goals, whilst still providing the user with the same desired availability of their equipment.

Needless to say, skills to ensure the efficient use of ATE would have to be developed and maintained; consideration given to the number of personnel to be taught the skills and the system so designed that the skills could be mastered by "ordinary" technicians in as short a time as possible.

On the other hand, care would have to be taken to avoid any situation whereby the employment of ATE ultimately causes a loss of expertise throughout associated technical trades. Such a loss would, with the passage of time and the associated wastage rate, create a shortage of top rate senior NCOs and Artificers in those trades.

In summarising it can be said that the implications of employing Automatic Test Equipments in a military environment, in terms of time, manpower and economy, are many. Most would be of advantage to the service and, with rationalisation and standardisation of equipments throughout all three services, of even greater advantage.

It is hoped this article will have provided a basis from which a better understanding of Automotive Test Equipments can be gained, particularly for those of us who are not intimately involved with such systems.

In a nutshell, ATE is a set of test equipment, preprogrammed with appropriate instructions to initiate a sequence of events to diagnose and test a range of PECs.

Supplied with a suitable library of software packages to provide the interface between items under test and the ATE, it need not be purchased as a customised support system for a single equipment but more appropriately for a range of equipments.

From time to time you may be asked your opinion on the use of the Automatic Test Equipment. I hope this article helps you form one.


Association Website Membership


